

# Reusable Bags

## A sustainable initiative for the transport and delivery of medications

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### Background

The healthcare industry has a large carbon footprint and is the second biggest contributor to landfill worldwide<sup>1</sup>. At Prince of Wales Hospital, all individually dispensed (non-impres) and accountable medications (Schedule 8 and 4D) are delivered in single-use paper bags which are placed into general waste bins upon delivery. In 4 months we order over 1500 single-use paper bags, 80% of these are used to deliver medications.

### Description

The proposed practice change involves replacing paper with reusable bags as a sustainable, confidential and secure method for the transport and delivery of all individually dispensed and accountable medication from the pharmacy department. This initiative aligns with the Environmental Protection Authority's highest priority – to avoid and reduce waste<sup>2</sup>.

### Results/Evaluation

After initial pilot in April 2019, evaluation of the reusable bags for delivery of accountable and individually dispensed medications was undertaken. A survey (using Quality Audit Reporting System (QARS)) was distributed for feedback.

- 24 respondents;
  - 11 RN's
  - 13 pharmacy staff (pharmacists, technicians and porters)

As a result of the survey data an instruction sheet was created and attached to each reusable bag for accountable medications to aid the RN's in the use of the bag.

### Implications and Conclusions

The introduction of reusable bags will have many positive outcomes for the pharmacy department and Prince of Wales Hospital, including;

#### Financial

- 80% reduction in expenditure equating to an approximate saving of \$260 per annum

#### Environmental

- Waste reduction in pharmacy department and hospital

#### Safety

- Safe and efficient transport of medications

### Where to next?

- Hospital wide roll out of reusable bags for individually dispensed (non-impres) medications
- Ongoing evaluation

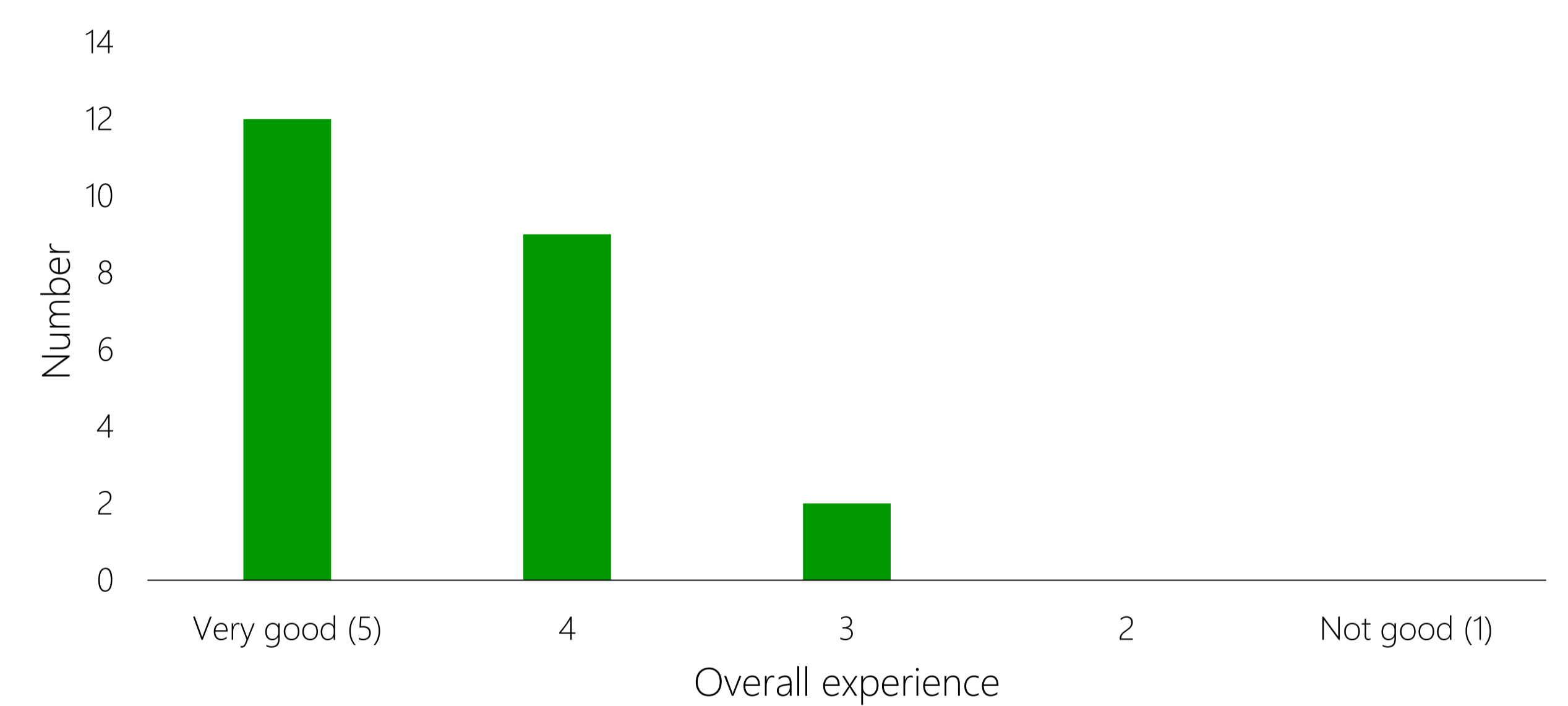

### Actions

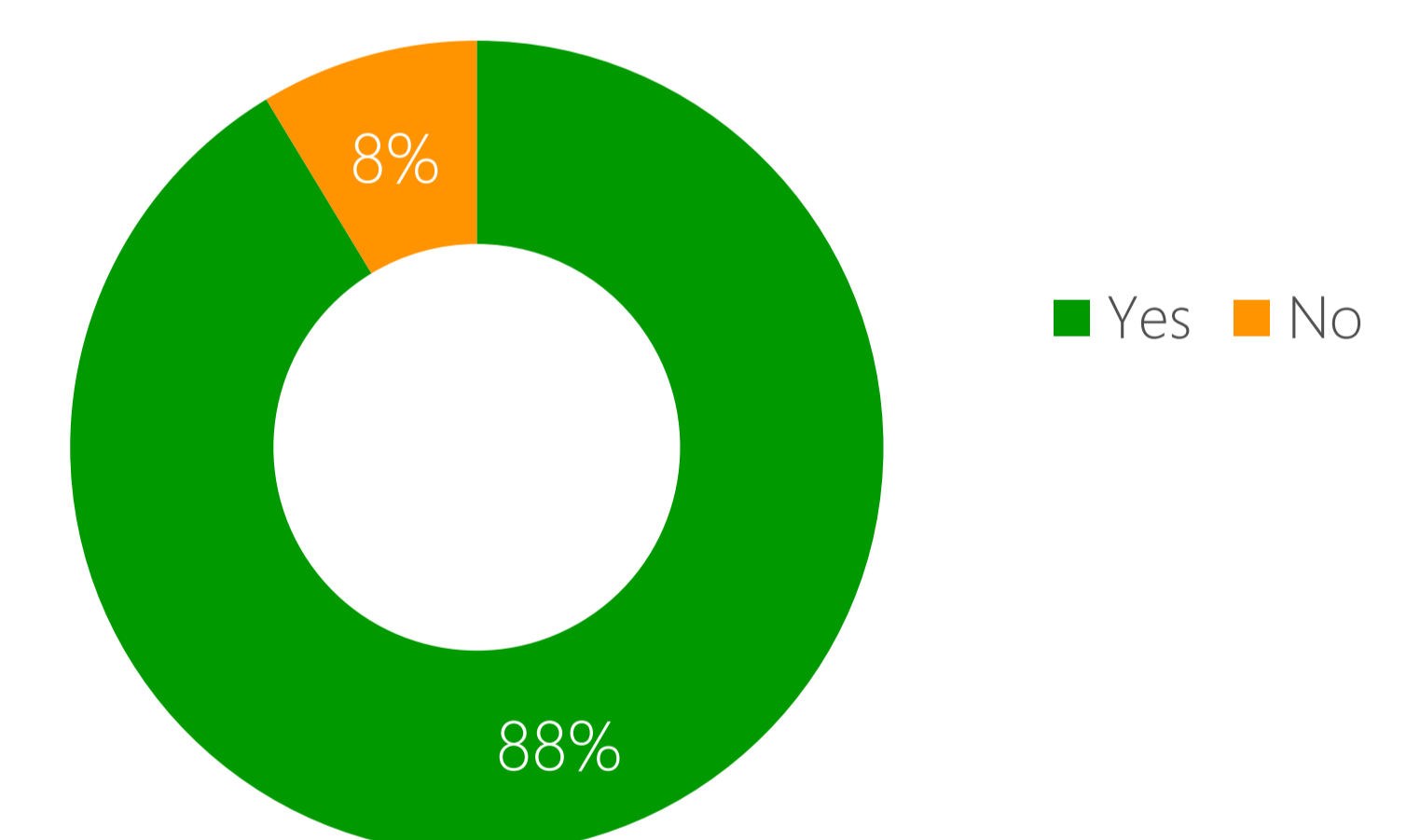
In April 2019, a pilot was conducted over a 4 week period where reusable bags were used for transporting and delivering all medications (accountable and non-impres) to one ward. The procedure for the use of reusable bags was developed prior and tested during this pilot period. The pilot was evaluated and reusable bag transport of accountable medications has been implemented across Prince of Wales Hospital.



88% (21/24) had a good experience (4-5 rating) and wanted to continue to use the bags for transporting accountable medications

- "Much more secure and tamper-proof than the paper bags currently used"
- "I think it's (reusable bags) great as it saves on using the paper bags"
- "It's great to see less waste"
- "Stronger than paper bags, more secure and environmentally friendly"
- "More secure rather than using paper bags that rip, also paper bags don't fit all medications, sometimes it is quite full. Also more sustainable for the environment."
